ALL personal belongings should be marked with your name.

- If you lose personal property you should firstly return to the locations that you may have lost it. If your item is not there, go to Lost Property in the Lecture Theatre, which is open before school, at break, at lunch, and after school.
- Please do not bring valuable items to school.
- W Mobile phones, iwatches, iPods and gaming devices are not allowed in school.

They are an easy target for theft and create significant problems in school. In the event of an emergency, permission may be given to use an office phone.

Minimum sanctions for failing to follow the rules for mobile phones, iwatches, iPods and gaming devices:

DURING LESSONS OUTSIDE OF LESSONS Confiscation and D2
Confiscation

Return: For a first offence in a school term the phone will be returned the same day. For subsequent offences in a term the phone will be returned to the student's parent, carer or guardian. If this is not possible the phone will be held until the end of the next school day when the student may collect it.

Further sanctions: Refusal to comply with these rules will lead to further sanctions for defiance.



Equipment for Lessons

You are expected to have:

- **W** Pens
- W Pencils
- W A ruler
- W An eraser
- A pencil sharpener
- A protractor
- A pair of compasses
- A scientific calculator
- **W** The necessary books/clothing/practical materials

Sanction:

▼ Failure to have the necessary equipment will lead to a D1 detention

In the event of a persistently ringing bell (without a break):

- Leave the building immediately. IN SILENCE.
- Leave by the nearest exit in an orderly manner. IN SILENCE.
- w Do not return to any school building until told to do so.
- Line up in accordance with the school's Fire Drill procedure.
- W Students are expected to remain in register order until dismissed.

In the event of a REAL emergency ANYONE can sound the alarms. But:

Malicious use of alarms is dangerous and WILL be punished.

Students should:

Read the Fire Drill procedures displayed in classrooms.

Ensure that they know where fire exits are located.

In the event of a continuous pulsed bell (like the lesson change bell)

Go straight to tutor rooms.

Remain in tutor rooms and await further instruction.

What to wear - Uniform Rules 2017-18

Years 7

Boys and Girls:

- The Warriner blazer*
- Black V-neck Warriner sweater*
- Plain black leather shoes. No trainers, plimsolls or boots.
- Black belt. Must fit a standard belt loop and have a plain buckle.

Boys:

- Plain white shirt, tucked into the trousers with the top button done up.
- Warriner tie*. A minimum of 7 stripes must be visible below the tie knot.
- Plain black trousers. Regular or Slim fit (not skinny fit). Denim or corduroy trousers are not permitted.

Girls:

- Plain white revere collar blouse, with the top button done up.
- Plain black trousers. Regular or Slim fit are permitted but NOT skinny fit. Denim or corduroy trousers are not permitted or
- Girls in Year 7 must wear a plain black <u>pleated</u> skirt hems must be no more than 10cm above the knee
- Plain black opaque or flesh coloured tights. No knee length socks or footless tights/leggings.



Additional Uniform Rules

Students will be expected to wear their blazer as follows:

- W To and from school.
- To and from lessons.
- At morning break.
- In the school canteen.
- Students may remove their blazers during lessons and at lunchtime.

In addition:

- W Students may wear a maximum of one small studded earring in each ear lobe.
- W No other piercings or retainers are allowed.
- W No other jewellery is allowed.
- Make-up must not be worn by Years 7

Nail varnish and acrylic nails must not be worn by Year 7 students

- Outer coats should be plain, one colour, and preferably dark.
- Plain scarves may be worn to and from school.
- Garments worn under shirts/blouses must be plain white.
- Any variations in uniform appropriate to different faiths should be black.
- W Hairstyles deemed inappropriate for school will not be permitted.
- *Blazers, sweaters, ties and skirts must be sourced from the school's supplier: Cross Embroidery Sweaters, belts and tights are optional garments

Summer Uniform Rules

- In the summer term sweaters may be worn, but only under a blazer.
- The Headteacher may permit students to stop wearing their blazers on a particular day.

Detentions:

D1 - Lateness • Lack of equipment preventing learning • Chewing Gum

D2 - Misuse of ICT • Use of prohibited devices • Step 3 of "sanctions"

D3 - More serious incidents including failure to attend a D2

These steps are for guidance however a teacher may begin to sanction at any step in order to protect the culture for learning within the room.



SANCTION	POSSIBLE REASONS
Verbal Warning	Minor breaches of the school's expectations
Loss of Break/ Informal detention	 Minor breaches of the school's expectations Poor conduct at break time
Lunchtime Detention	 More serious breaches of the school's expectations Rudeness • Failure to show respect to others
After School Detention	 Serious breaches of the school's expectations Truanting • Smoking • Associating with smokers
Friday Afternoon Detention	Failure to attend a formal detentionBehaviour that may lead to an exclusion
Internal Exclusion	 Serious breaches of the school's expectations Bullying • Physical violence • Defiant behaviour Damage to school property • Inappropriate language
External Exclusion	 Very serious breaches of the school's expectations Bullying • Physical violence • Defiant behaviour Damage to school property • Verbal abuse of staff
Permanent Exclusion	 Persistent breaches of the school's expectations Persistent bullying Violent assault The use or possession of drugs

The "Possible Reasons" are for guidance and to help students anticipate the likely consequences for breaches of the school's expectations. The school always reserves the right to use its judgement when applying sanctions.

With issues of bullying or the breakdown of friendships, the school will, wherever possible, use supportive and restorative approaches.
