The Warriner School Department aims to provide lively, stimulating and purposeful lessons for all our students. We have a range of specialist teaching spaces and equipment to help stimulate creativity and to aid students' development as they explore a variety of skills.

As well as developing students' subject knowledge, we aim to aid students in developing self-confidence, wellbeing and team-work skills—

vital skills for life—through the *practical* exploration of dramatic texts and the creation and performance of students' own original devised work.



TEACHING METHODS

We use a number of different teaching styles in this course as we explore aspects of drama and theatre both practically and theoretically.

Group work plays a very important part in this subject, as does peer review and teacher/ student feedback. Research projects lead into student-led sessions, in conjunction with more formal teacher input.

Rehearsal work on the plays studied forms a vital part of the learning process. This feeds into the critical review of performance work by both students and professional companies.

Steps to Success in GCSE Drama

- 1. Be enthusiastic in lessons 'Have a go'!
- 2. You must attend all lessons and rehearsals (lunchtime and after school) to avoid letting others down in group assessment situations.
- 3. Be supportive of others' performance work. You can learn a lot from evaluating the work of other people.
- 4. Be organised about looking after the notes and scripts you are given. Complete all written tasks diligently. This will help you in your coursework and final examination.
- 5. Attend as much live theatre as possible. This doesn't have to be in London! The Mill Arts Centre in Banbury has lots of fantastic plays.
- 6. Be the leader do not be afraid to initiate ideas. Listen to everyone's ideas and select the best ones to try out.
- 7. Listen to the advice of your teachers and act upon it.
- 8. Think about the emotions of the character. Can you imagine how they feel?
- 9. Think about your voice: pitch, pace and volume.
- 10. Think about your body language, posture, facial expressions and gestures.
- 11. Keep a journal of all the lessons in which you participate. Explain the skills you are learning or developing. Make sure you keep a record of the ideas you contributed and how others responded to those ideas and how you respond to the ideas of others.
- 12. Drama written work is about process! Keep on top of your written notes, don't skip a week! Its very difficult to remember!
