Golding's Big Ideas

Humans are inherently evil; we all have the capacity to commit evil. The boys represent humanity and are a microcosm of our doomed and self-destructive nature. By reverting to savagery, they reflect the fall of man.

The "beast" is all the boys' fears: it is the force of evil that Golding believes is in all of us.

Golding questions civilisation itself; against man's innate savagery it seems weak. The potential for evil cannot be eliminated by a democracy.

The novel explores the conflict between two competing impulses:

The instinct to live by rules, act peacefully, follow moral commands, and value the good of the group.

The instinct to gratify one's immediate desires, act violently to obtain supremacy over others, and enforce one's will.

The important thing to understand about the loss of innocence of these boys is not that is was done to them but rather a natural experience that they each have as a result of living in a wild environment.

Writer's methods: Structure and Form Key Vocabulary +

The novel has a form of an adventure story. It's linear with 12 chapters.

Golding uses symbolism and allegory to portray the island as a microcosm of society and the real world.

Golding builds fear and tension through foreshadowing and the gradual descent from order to chaos.
